

Emerald

Best known as the birthstone of May, the green of emeralds also symbolizes royalty.

Emeralds can actually be a variety of hues from bluish-green to green and yellow-ish green. There are also green beryls that are not "true" emeralds.

Chromium and vanadium play the biggest role in an emerald's color, with iron playing a role occasionally. Emeralds need ingredients from both felsic and mafic rocks to get their color, preferably close in proximity, quite a rare condition in the field.

Emeralds are classified as a type III gemstone, meaning inclusions are very common and acceptable. Type I gems are inclusion-free more often than not, such as topaz and aquamarine, and type II gems are usually included such as rubies and sapphires.

The unique set of inclusions an emerald gem has is often referred to as its jardin. This is Spanish for "garden" since the term is most often used in Colombian emeralds. Such inclusions are typically elongate and rod-like, resembling tree branches and roots, hence the moniker.

If an inclusion-free emerald is spotted on the market, you are probably dealing with a fake.

May's Birthstone - Emerald

Carnaíba emeralds are nothing to shake a stick at as some major record-breakers have been mined from this area. The first was discovered in the summer of 1974 when a cut specimen weighed in at a whopping 86,136 carats (nearly 38 pounds)!

The largest natural uncut single emerald crystal was found in Colombia (1969) weighing in at 7,205 carats (nearly 3 pounds), called the Emilia Crystal. In more recent times, Carnaíba struck the record books again when a 794-pound, 4.3-foot high, matrix specimen was unearthed in 2017. It took a team of ten, a week, to transport the specimen from 200 meters (656 feet) underground. With an estimated value of \$309 million.

The specimen serves as a very close cousin to the infamous Bahia emerald, which was found in 2001 and only 100 meters (328 feet) away. The Bahia was once a subject of a decade-plus long legal battle over its rightful ownership.

Echinoderms: Fossils of Marine History

Echinoderms are interesting to the fossil collector as there are more identified fossil (extinct) species than living (extant) species.

Both the 6,500 plus living species and the 14,000 plus fossil species are marine. Fossil echinoderms give clues to the ancient past including the depth and conditions where they lived.

Echinoderms are more closely related to the higher forms of life than any of the other invertebrates.

This group of marine animals includes sea lilies (Crinoidea), blastoids, cystoids, starfish (Asteroidea), brittle stars (Ophiuroidea), sea urchins and sand dollars (Echinoidea) and sea cucumbers (Holothuroidea).

Echinoderms are found as fossils as far back as 540 million years, the most common being crinoids and blastoids.

Echinoderms are conducive to forming fossils because their body consists of a series of interlocking calcareous (CaCo3) plates usually with five-point symmetry. This is readily seen in the interlocking discs that make up the stem of crinoids. These discs frequently get separated after the animal dies and they fossilize as individual circles.

While dinosaurs draw attention when naming a state fossil, Missouri has tapped an echinoderm for the top fossil spot picking the sea lily, Delocrinus missouriensis.

Although Iowa does not have a top fossil, the crinoid was nominated in the past because these creatures make up a significant portion of the state's limestone deposits.

A 2018 resolution says there are significant crinoid deposits in the lowa cities of Burlington, Le Grand and Gilmore City and states that Burlington has been called the "crinoid capital of the world" by paleontologists.

There have also been proposals to name the sea biscuit as the state fossil of Florida.

Fire Agate From Joy Valley, Arizona

Fire agate is a rare variety of agate and a relatively new gemstone. It was first identified and formally recognized as a gemstone in the 1930s.

So far, fire agate has only been found in volcanic rocks of the desert regions of the southwestern United States and central Mexico.

The southwestern United States and Mexico had intense volcanism during the middle and later parts of the Tertiary Period, and the crust underwent extension and uplift.

Fire agates formed when hydrothermal fluids, subjected to tremendous temperatures and pressures, became saturated with iron oxides and dissolved minerals leached from the volcanic host rocks.

Cracks and voids in the volcanic rocks filled with these hydrothermal fluids, and the fluids were often saturated with dissolved silica.

As the rocks cooled, the iron oxides, minerals and silica came out of solution and formed deposits of agate, some of which had the right proportion and conditions of formation to result in fire agates. The formation of fire agate is complex, and the right conditions to form fire agate were rare.

The hydrothermal fluids sometimes did not carry dissolved minerals but were still saturated with silica. These fluids filled the cracks and voids in the host volcanic rock and when the rocks cooled the material was often a white, semi-translucent form of agate known as chalcedony. Much of the chalcedony in volcanic rocks is often white and has a bubbly appearance.

As the crust extended and the mountain ranges uplifted, erosion began to wear away at the rocks. The softer volcanic rocks with fire agate and chalcedony eroded away, leaving the fire agate and chalcedony on the surface. Many of the harder volcanic rocks did not erode and the agates and chalcedony remained in place. Many sources that have fire agate and chalcedony in place have been developed as small surface quarries mined specifically for fire agate. The white chalcedony, while still attractive, is not as valued as the fire agate.

Joy Valley was once maintained by BLM as a rockhounding location, but the remoteness of the area resulted in BLM abandoning the location because of the cost of maintaining the road to the site and the lack of visitors. The Joy Valley locality is in the Whitlock Valley and west of the Peloncillo Mountains. Agates that weathered out of the volcanic rocks there are likely Quaternary in age.

Bench Tips from Brad Smith

PRE-MADE BEZEL CUPS

As a general rule of thumb I assume it's going to take me 15 - 20 minutes to make a bezel for an ordinary cabochon, so for some projects buying pre-made cups can save a lot of time. But if you go this route, keep in mind three things. First, try to get cups made from fine silver, not sterling. Fine silver is softer and burnishes over the stone more easily.

Second, you may have trouble matching the shape and size of the stone with the shape and size of the bezel cup. Purchased cups can only be found in a limited number of standard sizes. You may have to adjust your choice of gemstone to match the cup. The other consideration is that pre-made cups often have fairly low side walls. While these are fine for low-dome stones, they're not dependable for stones with steep side walls.

Lastly before setting, check the fit of your gemstone in the cup, particularly around the bottom. The bottom corners of a stamped cup are much more rounded than a bezel you would fabricate yourself. This causes a problem with stones that have a sharp edge around the bottom. Burnishing the bezel over one of these stones will place a lot of stress on the stone and may cause it to crack. To avoid this, I round off the bottom edge of the stone with a diamond file (or use sandpaper on soft stones).



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
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
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
